

Connectives Syntax

Connectives are words used to increase text cohesion and coherence. Connectives or signal words provide transitions in thought, speech and writing.

Procedure for Introducing the Skill:

I do:

- 1. Teacher explains that a connective or signal word helps the reader identify a shift of thought is coming in the content of the sentence.
- 2. Teacher models various connectives using guiding questions of:
 - Why (shift or change)
 - Why (support)
 - What Happened (conclusion)
 - When (time reference)

We do:

Read sentences with students and insert an appropriate connective in the blank and discuss why.

You do:

Students read sentences and practice inserting an appropriate connective in the blank and justify their answer.

Examples of Guiding Sentences:

Why - Change/shift in ideas:

John was late, however he was going to Helen's Place.

Why - Aid Support:

John was late <u>because</u> he was going to Helen's Place.

What Happened - Conclude:

John was late so he was going to Helen's Place.

When - Time/Order:

John was late <u>before</u> he was going to Helen's place.
